

Primary Years Programme

• In the Primary Years Programme, service learning falls under the essential element of **action**. (*Making the PYP Happen* pages 25-27)



PYP: Action as Service

- Service to fellow students and to the larger community (inside and outside of school)
- Goal=development of cooperation, problem solving, conflict resolution, and creative and critical thinking
- Way for students to demonstrate the attributes of the learner profile and attitudes
- "The actions that the students choose to take as a result of the learning may be considered the most significant summative assessment of the efficacy of the programme." (Making the PYP Happen 2009)

PYP: Action as Service

- PYP students can identify appropriate action
- Teachers are responsible to enable the students to choose their action carefully, facilitate this action, and encourage the students to reflect on the action they undertake
- Action can begin with self, family, classroom, hallways, and playground and can demonstrate respect for self, others, and the environment

PYP Effective action:

- modeled by adults in school community
- Voluntary = student initiated
- grounded in concrete experiences, part of units of inquiry
- beneficial when students can witness the outcome
- begins in a small way and arises from genuine concern and commitment
- includes anticipation of consequences, and accepting of responsibility
- may require appropriate adult support
- Included in Exhibition (action as a result of learning)

What Does Service Learning Look Like in the MYP

Service Learning is a teaching and learning strategy, with academic objectives, that integrates meaningful community service with instruction and reflection to enrich the learning experience, teach civic responsibility, and strengthen communities.

Action is wider than service. It can include any of the above as well as **advocacy** and the **decision not to act!** "Service is part of action (how) that can provide an important motivation for significant and real-world experiential learning (why); service can be powerfully anchored in curriculum (what), and its reflexive goal is development of students who embody the learner profile (who)." IB

- So what is ACTION in the IB?
 - a strategy and an outcome
 - learning by doing
 - enhancing learning about self and others
 - making responsible choices, sometimes including decisions not to act, and reflecting on them

Service as ACTION promotes social and emotional growth, and develops affective and cognitive skills such as cooperation, problem-solving, conflict resolution, and creative and critical thinking . . . while making a difference for someone, somewhere.

What is the school's role in providing action/service opportunities and experiences that motivate the 11-16-year-old

- understanding of classroom/school climate and procedures, expectations, culture
- understanding of the curriculum, its content and concepts
- relationship of curriculum to *learning* (establishing connections)
- service as rising from the curriculum
- access to service experiences for all learners
- thorough communication with all stakeholders
- safety
- awareness of potential community partners, where applicable
- **,** ?


Where do ideas for service opportunities come from?

Through service, students develop and apply personal and social skills in real-life situations involving decision-making, problem-solving, initiative, responsibility, and accountability for their actions.

Indirect service

Students actions impact others without ever actually engaging with the recipients

Advocacy

Speaking on behalf of an issue to promote awareness

Research

Collecting information designed to influence policy or practice
